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



#### **DIRECTOR'S NOTE:**

I found this passage which represents quite deeply how I feel about the acting process and the dedication of my actors in this production:

"Actors are some of the most courageous people on the face of the earth. They deal with more day-to-day rejection in one year than most people do in an entire lifetime. Every day, actors face the financial challenge of living a freelance lifestyle, the disrespect of people who think they should get real jobs, and their own fears that they'll never work again. Every day they have to ignore the possibility that their vision to which they have dedicated their lives, is a pipe dream. With every role, they stretch themselves emotionally and physically, risking criticism and judgment. With every passing year, many of them watch as other people their age achieve the predictable milestones of normal lives...the car, the family, the house, the nest egg.

But actors stay true to their dreams in spite of sacrifices. Why? Because actors are willing to give their entire lives to the moment – to that line, that laugh, that gesture, or that interpretation that will stir the audience's soul. Actors are beings who have tasted life's nectar in that crystal moment when they poured out their creative spirits and touched another's heart. In that instant, they are as close to magic and perfection as anyone could ever be. And in their own hearts, they know that to dedicate oneself to that moment is worth a thousand lifetimes." – Jack Heller

~ Harold Pinter, Art, Truth & Politics, The Nobel Lecture **Harold Pinter** After studying at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and the Central School of Speech and Drama, he worked as an actor under the stage name David Baron. Following his success as a playwright, he continued to act under his own name, on stage and screen. He last acted in 2006 when he appeared in Beckett's *Krapp's Last Tape* at the Royal Court Theatre, directed by Ian Rickson.

He wrote 29 plays, including *The Birthday Party, The Dumb Waiter, A Slight Ache, The Hothouse, The Caretaker, The Collection, The Lover, The Homecoming, Old Times, No Man's Land, Betrayal, A Kind of Alaska, One For The Road, The New World Order, Moonlight and Ashes to Ashes.* Sketches include *The Black and White, Request Stop, That's Your Trouble, Night, Precisely, Apart From That* and the recently rediscovered *Umbrellas*.

He directed 27 theatre productions, including James Joyce's *Exiles*, David Mamet's *Oleanna*, seven plays by Simon Gray (one of which was *Butley* in 1971, for which he directed the film adaptation three years later) and many of his own plays, including his last, *Celebration*, paired with his first, *The Room*, at The Almeida Theatre, London in the spring of 2000. He wrote 21 screenplays, including *The Pumpkin Eater*, *The Servant*, *The Go-Between*, *The French Lieutenant's Woman* and *Sleuth*.

In 2005 he received the Nobel Prize for Literature. Other awards include the Companion of Honour for services to Literature, the Legion D'Honneur, the European Theatre Prize the Laurence Olivier Award and the Moliere D'Honneur for lifetime achievement. In 1999 he was made a Companion of Literature by the Royal Society of Literature. Harold Pinter was awarded 18 honorary degrees.

He died in 2008 at the age of 78.

More recent forays in the theater include Neil Simon's London Suite, The Man Who Came to Dinner, and The Games Afoot, all at Group Rep. Other theater credits: Terrance Rattigan's Separate Tables, directed by Jules Aaron; Engaging Shaw, directed by Melanie

McQueen, at Theatre 40; Ferenc Molnar's *The Guardsman*, directed by Lillian Groag; *Diary of Anne Frank*; Harold Pinter's *The Lover* (LA Weekly Best One-Act); and Pinter's *A Slight Ache*, directed by Carol Reis. At the Lillian Theatre: *The Great Sebastians*, directed by Anthony Caldarella, George Bernard Shaw's *Ceasar and Cleopatra*, *Idiot's Delight*, and *Twentieth Century*, directed by Rick Sparks. Susan starred in the psychological thriller, Serving Up Richard AKA, The Guest Room, with Jude Ciccolella of 24 and Ross McCall of White Collar, written and directed by Henry Olek. She wrote and starred in the LGBT festival favorite, What's Up, Scarlet? with Sally Kirkland, Jere Burns and Musetta Vander. Other indies include leads in, My Brother Jack and Mafioso, and the shorts, Good, and Miss Dixie High. Susan recently played the lead in Sisterhood of Secrets for Lifetime and starred in indie films Dead Mail (with theater favorite John Fleck), Dog Fugitive, and Scalper (with Jake Busey and Bai Ling); Susan began her career as a ballet dancer and trained under George Balanchine at the School of American Ballet in New York City. Her professional career in dance included Eglevsky Ballet in New York City, the Hannover Ballet in Germany, and, finally, the Cleveland Ballet, all of which she toured extensively. In New York, she publicized off-Broadway premieres of Murray Mednick's *Mayakovsky and Stalin* at the Cherry Lane, Latina Christmas Special at the Soho Playhouse, and *Our Man in Santiago* at the new AMT She has served on the boards of directors of the Los Angeles Theatre Alliance, Women in Theatre, and P.A.T.H. (Performing Arts Theatre for the Handicapped).

Linda Toliver and Gary Guidinger (Producers) recently produced at the Odyssey Theatre, A *Streetcar Named Desire* directed by Jack Heller, and the rarely seen Tennessee Williams' classic *Kingdom of Earth*, directed by Michael Arabian. Also at the Odyssey, Gary and Linda produced Justin Tanner's *Day Drinkers*, under Bart DeLorenzo's direction; Elliot Shoenman's *Aftermath*, directed by Mark Taylor, starring Annie Potts; *Assisted Living* starring Winnie Holtzman and Paul Dooley with Larry Biederman directing. They produced *Hunger: In Bed With Roy Cohn* in Los Angeles, and *Ethel Sings* at New York's Soho Rep, Walkerspace, both written by Joan Beber.

They were the producing directors of Los Angeles' Zephyr Theater for 25 years until moving on as independent producers. During that time they developed and produced many award-winning shows, including Justin Tanner's standout hit, *Voice Lessons*, directed by Bart DeLorenzo, starring Laurie Metcalf, French Stewart and Maile Flanagan, later resulting in an Off-Broadway production and Chicago's Steppenwolf Theatre production; *Teen Girl*, starring Zoe Perry, directed by Matt Roth; *Space Therapy*, starring Mary Scheer, French Stewart and the Avenue 43 Ensemble. They presented the trio of Del Shores plays *Sordid Lives*, *Southern Baptists Sissies* and *The Trials and Tribulations of a Trailer Trash Housewife*, starring Beth Grant, Octavia Spencer, Dale Dickey and Leslie Jordan. They also produced Jim Brochu and Steve Schlaclin's *The Big Voice: God or Merman?* and *The Last Session*, both of which went on to long-running hits Off-Broadway.

Together they founded the puppet collective Freak Nature Puppets where they spend most of their time making and performing with giant pageant puppets. Past projects include props design for the puppet play, Dream Fluff, producing the performance art and concert series Out of Body Expo in San Francisco's Golden Gate Park, and puppet performances at the Elysian Theater. They are currently developing their next full-length puppet play, *Nosferatu's Sweet 16*.

Kiff Scholl, AFK DESIGN (Graphic Designer) has a long history of designing original and eye-catching graphics for Los Angeles theatre and film productions. Long-time theatre clients include Theatre Planners, Sierra Madre Playhouse, The Athena Cats, West Coast Jewish Theatre, Indie Chi, KADM Productions, Sacred Fools, Theatre of NOTE, as well as numerous independent productions at the Odyssey, Hudson, Complex, and El Portal theaters. 

Shelly Kurtz (The Match Seller) Shelly is happy to reunite with Henry and Susan following previous productions of The *Great Sebastians, Caesar and Cleopatra*, and *Twentieth Century*. Shelly began his acting career in New York and, after working there for ten years, came to California. He has acted in over 150 stage plays including *Walking the Tightrope* written by Mike Kenny and directed by Debbie Divine for the 24th Street Theater, *Don't Forget to Remember*, written by Patricia Parker and directed by Kiff Scholl, *The Exercise* written by Lou Carlino and directed by Alex Bruhanski, and *Broadway Bound*, written by Neil Simon and

directed by Howard Teichman for the West Coast Jewish Theater. Some of Shelly's 40-plus films include *The Impossible Joy* (short) I *Look Out for Ed Wole* (short), *Bartime* (short), *Top Dogs* (short). HI feather roles include: *The Darkling, A Dark Foe, Adopted in Danger, Batteries Not Included, Dating Daisy* and *Miriam*. **Jack Heller (Director)** most recently directed A Streetcar Named Desire at the Odyssey in a production Cultural Weekly called "exceptional." As an awardwinning director, he has staged sixty productions throughout the U.S. and Canada. He was the founder and director of the Laurelgrove Theatre Company, receiving four Ovation nominations in its first three seasons. As an actor, he appeared on Broadway in One by One and LUV, and in the national company of LUV. Heller appeared in Henry Jaglom's Queen of the Lot and also in Jaglom's long-running play, Just 45 Minutes from Broadway. He received critical acclaim for creating the role of Tennessee in Tennessee in the Summer at the Egyptian Arena in Hollywood. Heller won a Drama-Logue Award in the oneman show Dr. Galley at Theater East. He starred in two long-running shows in Los Angeles: Nuts and Tamara, touring Italy with the latter. He has directed and acted in numerous "Critic's Choice" and "Critic's Pick" theater productions as well as in numerous television episodes. Jack studied at NYU and with Harold Clurman and Robert Lewis of the Group Theatre. He has taught at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts and is a lifetime member of the Actors Studio in the directing and acting units. He is the co-creator of Unbound Productions and their popular, immersive Halloween show, *Wicked Lit.* Jeff is also a director and will be helming the premiere of a new play about Tesla and Edison called *Power and Light* at Theatre 40 in March. Other premiere plays Jeff has directed include *Martians: An Evening with Ray Bradbury*, which he also co-wrote with Charlie Mount, and *Villainy*, about serial killer H.H. Holmes. Jeff also does Production Design, Sculpting, and EFX work for the film industry, having worked on *Planet of the Apes, Armageddon, Flubber, Con-Air*, and Universal Studios' *Back to the Future* ride. He also teaches set and film production design at FIDM and other film schools in LA.

Ellen Monocroussos (Lighting Designer) has designed the lighting for hundreds of productions nationwide.
