or four decades, Latino Theater Company has proudly served the Los Angeles community, championing diverse voices and illuminating the rich, complex tapestry of the Latina/o/x experience in the United States. As we celebrate this milestone 40th Anniversary, we present a season that embodies our mission: a vibrant collection of stories reflecting where we've been, who we are, and the futures we dare to imagine — all under the unifying magic of live theatre.

This landmark season features world premieres from our Circle of Imaginistas playwrights' initiative, a powerful revival from our history through our Impact Initiative, and a celebrated encore from our 2024 Encuentro Festival, each illuminating our shared human experience.

We began our 40th anniversary season with the West Coast Premiere of Karen Zacarías' insightful *Just Like Us*, adapted from Colorado's former First Lady, Helen Thorpe's, best-selling non-fiction book. This timely drama followed four Latina high school seniors, best friends who navigate the rituals of prom and graduation while possessing college dreams, but two are undocumented. The play exposed how a piece of paper dictates opportunity, crafts identity, and challenges friendships, while laying bare the complexities of immigration in the U.S., asking what it truly means to belong

in the United States.

Next, we presented the wildly inventive World Premiere of *The Last Play by Rickérby Hinds*. A Circle of Imaginistas playwrights' initiative commission, this meta-theatrical journey dived into the creative mind as playwright Rickérby Hinds put himself on stage, wrestling with writer's block, his Afro-Latino identity, hip hop aesthetics, and artistic legacy. Conjuring characters from his past works, the play poignantly deconstructed the relationship between creator and creation, asking profound questions about voice, representation, and the nature of storytelling itself.

Closing out our spring season was an encore production from 2024's Encuentro Festival—in association with Chicago's innovative Water People Theater, LTC presented Rebeca Alemán's haunting *The Delicate Tears of the Waning Moon*. Based on true events in a turbulent Latin American country, this powerful drama followed Paulina, a human rights journalist recovering from amnesia after an assassination attempt. The play was a powerful meditation on the profound personal cost of reporting truth, the nature of grief, and the fragility of freedom in the face of corruption.

Over the summer we proudly presented a revival production of LTC's seminal work, *August 29*, as part of our Impact Initiative, bringing theatre directly into partnership with our community, in collaboration with Los Angeles Community College students. This play revisits the life, work, and tragic murder of journalist Ruben Salazar during the 1970 Chicano Moratorium against the Vietnam War. Exploring the complexities of Chicano identity, the fight against police brutality, and the power of the press, *August 29* remains startlingly relevant, reminding us of the enduring power of community activism in the struggle for justice.

On Saturday, September 13, we celebrated **Noche de Luz y Sombra**, the 40th Anniversary of the Latino Theater Company.

We laughed, we cried, we celebrated, and yes—we danced the night away. We came together with friends, familia, allies, supporters—our community. We witnessed the true power of theatre, as our company took the stage to share their history, their friendship, and their bond á la chicano-noir.

Our fall season opens the year's second Circle of Imaginistas World Premiere, *The Little King of Norwalk* by Israel López Reyes. With a satirical eye, López Reyes brings us a razor-sharp contemporary fable set in Southeastern Los Angeles. When Juan Perez, a normal guy grappling with his past and a recent DUI, is mistaken for a powerful political consultant, he's drawn into the corrupt underbelly of local politics. The play hilariously and poignantly explores themes of Chicano identity, the allure of power, family legacy, community belonging, and the difficult path to redemption.

Next is another World Premiere commissioned through our Circle of Imaginistas, Miranda González's exploration of the little-known underground railroad into Mexico, *Mascogos*. A trilingual and non-linear drama, this thematically innovative play follows 18-year-old Jamari in 1864 Mexico and present-day Chicago's West Side, and asks profound questions about the meaning of freedom in the painful past and the imperfect present. González's play illuminates the contributions and experience of Afro-Latinos to the rich and complicated tapestry of both the past and contemporary American life.

Next we present our third production with Artists at Play, among the most exciting companies to emerge in Los Angeles, and who are dedicated to illuminating the AAPI experience in the U.S., with the World Premiere of Ankita Raturi's delightfully touching नेहा & Neel. What starts as a meticulously planned college tour for Neha (नेहा) and her seventeen-year-old son Neel (नील) quickly derails into a chaotic and hilarious cross-country road trip across the

United States, exploring the intricate relationship of a mother and her son. The play navigates the conflicts and tenderness between an immigrant mother and her American-born child, the nuances of identity, and the bittersweet but inevitable process of a parent learning to let go while a child emerges into adulthood.

We close our 40th year with our annual production of *La Virgen De Guadalupe, Dios Inantzin*. Adapted for the stage by Evelina Fernández from the mid-16th century text *The Nican Mopohua*, and featuring over 100 actors, singers and indigenous Aztec dancers as well as children and seniors from the community, *La Virgen De Guadalupe, Dios Inantzin* is the City of L.A.'s largest theatrical holiday production. Become transfixed by the story of Juan Diego, a simple peasant to whom the Virgin Mary appeared on four occasions in the mountains of Tepeyac near Mexico City in 1531, and his universal story of perseverance and hope.

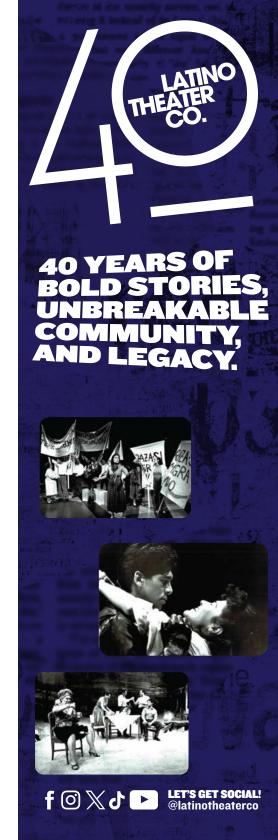

José Luis is the Artistic Director of the Latino Theater Company (LTC) and The Los Angeles Theatre Center (The LATC), and an Emeritus Distinguished Professor at UCLA's School of Theater, Film & Television. An award-winning director, he has been a visionary advocate for Chicanx/Latinx theater for over 30 years. At The LATC, he created the Latino Theatre Lab in 1985. At the Mark Taper Forum, he established the Latino Theater Initiative in 1991. His LTC directing credits include Whittier Boulevard, Sleep with the Angels. The Mother of Henry. Solitude, Premeditation, Dementia, and A Mexican Trilogy. National credits include Macbeth (Oregon Shakespeare Festival) and Karen Zacarías' Destiny of Desire (Arena Stage, South Coast Rep, Goodman Theatre, and Oregon Shakespeare Festival). International credits include Henrik Ibsen's Peer Gynt (Norland

Theatre, Norway) and Manuel Puig's Kiss of the Spider Woman (National Theatre of Norway). He was awarded the 2024 Gordon Davidson Award by the Stage Directors and Choreographers Foundation and the 2025 Stage Raw Lifetime Achievement Award. He also served on the 2025 Pulitzer Prize jury for Drama.

### FRANÇOIS-PIERRE COUTURE

(Scenic Design) Originally from Montréal, François-Pierre has had the privilege of working in Los Angeles and across the U.S. for the last decade as a scenic, lighting, and projection designer. He has taught at East Los Angeles College, UCLA, LMU, and Pepperdine University, and is currently ELAC's Scenic, Lighting, and Projection Professor.
