or four decades, Latino Theater Company has proudly served the Los Angeles community, championing diverse voices and illuminating the rich, complex tapestry of the Latina/o/x experience in the United States. As we celebrate this milestone 40th Anniversary, we present a season that embodies our mission: a vibrant collection of stories reflecting where we've been, who we are, and the futures we dare to imagine — all under the unifying magic of live theatre.

This landmark season features world premieres from our Circle of Imaginistas playwrights' initiative, a powerful revival from our history through our Impact Initiative, and a celebrated encore from our 2024 Encuentro Festival, each illuminating our shared human experience.

We began our 40th anniversary season with the West Coast Premiere of Karen Zacarías' insightful *Just Like Us*, adapted from Colorado's former First Lady, Helen Thorpe's, best-selling non-fiction book. This timely drama followed four Latina high school seniors, best friends who navigate the rituals of prom and graduation while possessing college dreams, but two are undocumented. The play exposed how a piece of paper dictates opportunity, crafts identity, and challenges friendships, while laying bare the complexities of immigration in the U.S., asking what it truly means to belong

in the United States.

Next, we presented the wildly inventive World Premiere of *The Last Play by Rickérby Hinds*. A Circle of Imaginistas playwrights' initiative commission, this meta-theatrical journey dived into the creative mind as playwright Rickérby Hinds put himself on stage, wrestling with writer's block, his Afro-Latino identity, hip hop aesthetics, and artistic legacy. Conjuring characters from his past works, the play poignantly deconstructed the relationship between creator and creation, asking profound questions about voice, representation, and the nature of storytelling itself.

Closing out our spring season was an encore production from 2024's Encuentro Festival—in association with Chicago's innovative Water People Theater, LTC presents Rebeca Alemán's haunting *The Delicate Tears of the Waning Moon*. Based on true events in a turbulent Latin American country, this powerful drama followed Paulina, a human rights journalist recovering from amnesia after an assassination attempt. The play was a powerful meditation on the profound personal cost of reporting truth, the nature of grief, and the fragility of freedom in the face of corruption.

Over the summer we proudly presented a revival production of LTC's seminal work, *August 29*, as part of our Impact Initiative, bringing theatre directly into partnership with our community, in collaboration with Los Angeles Community College students. This play revisits the life, work, and tragic murder of journalist Ruben Salazar during the 1970 Chicano Moratorium against the Vietnam War. Exploring the complexities of Chicano identity, the fight against police brutality, and the power of the press, *August 29* remains startlingly relevant, reminding us of the enduring power of community activism in the struggle for justice.

On Saturday, September 13, we celebrated **Noche de Luz y Sombra**, the 40th Anniversary of the Latino Theater Company,

We laughed, we cried, we celebrated, and yes—we danced the night away. We came together with friends, familia, allies, supporters—our community. We witnessed the true power of theatre, as our company took the stage to share their history, their friendship, and their bond a la chicano-noir.

Our fall season opens the year's second Circle of Imaginistas World Premiere, *The Little King of Norwalk* by Israel López Reyes. With a satirical eye, López Reyes brings us a razor-sharp contemporary fable set in Southeastern Los Angeles. When Juan Perez, a normal guy grappling with his past and a recent DUI, is mistaken for a powerful political consultant, he's drawn into the corrupt underbelly of local politics. The play hilariously and poignantly explores themes of Chicano identity, the allure of power, family legacy, community belonging, and the difficult path to redemption.

Next is another World Premiere commissioned through our Circle of Imaginistas, Miranda González's exploration of the little-known underground railroad into Mexico, *Mascógos*. A trilingual and non-linear drama, this thematically innovative play follows 18-year-old Jamari in 1864 Mexico and present-day Chicago's West Side, and asks profound questions about the meaning of freedom in the painful past and the imperfect present. Gonzalez's play illuminates the contributions and experience of Afro-Latinos to the rich and complicated tapestry of both the past and contemporary American life.

Next we present our third production with Artists at Play, among the most exciting companies to emerge in Los Angeles, and who are dedicated to illuminating the AAPI experience in the U.S., with the World Premiere of Ankita Raturi's delightfully touching नेहा & Neel. What starts as a meticulously planned college tour for Neha (नेहा) and her seventeen-year-old son Neel (नील) quickly derails into a chaotic and hilarious cross-country road trip across the

United States, exploring the intricate relationship of a mother and her son. The play navigates the conflicts and tenderness between an immigrant mother and her American-born child, the nuances of identity, and the bittersweet but inevitable process of a parent learning to let go while a child emerges into adulthood.

We close our 40th year with our annual production of *La Virgen De Guadalupe, Dios Inantzin*. Adapted for the stage by Evelina Fernández from the mid-16th century text *The Nican Mopohua*, and featuring over 100 actors, singers and indigenous Aztec dancers as well as children and seniors from the community, *La Virgen De Guadalupe, Dios Inantzin* is the City of L.A.'s largest theatrical holiday production. Become transfixed by the story of Juan Diego, a simple peasant to whom the Virgin Mary appeared on four occasions in the mountains of Tepeyac near Mexico City in 1531, and his universal story of perseverance and hope.



She starred opposite Alfred Molina in The Father at Pasadena Playhouse (LADCC Award, Best Ensemble) and created the role of Leela in Orange at South Coast Repertory. Pia has originated roles in new plays at Center Theatre Group, Geffen Playhouse, Ojai Playwrights Conference, and beyond. Artists at Play is a Los Angeles-based theatre-producing collective dedicated to programming that explores the Asian American and Pacific Islander experience. Since 2011, we have presented plays that demonstrate the humanity and complexity of diverse AAPI communities while championing and uplifting AAPI theatre artists who give voice to our past, present and future.

Artists at Play's mainstage productions have achieved box office success and critical acclaim, including "Critics' Choice" by numerous news outlets and a GLAAD Media Award nomination. AAP's producing history includes Los Angeles premieres, West Coast premieres, and world premieres.

Through our New Play Development program, Artists at Play has provided resources and support to 27 playwrights in crafting new work, with a third of those plays going on to world premiere productions across the United States and Canada. Since 2022, we have commissioned 6 new plays, continuing to add new AAPI narratives to the canon of American theatre.

Since 2015, Artists at Play has presented free Theatre for Young Audiences performances as a way to encourage youth to build empathy and understanding between diverse people. These shows have been presented in partnership with the Los Angeles Public Library, Japanese American National Museum and USC Pacific Asia Museum.

Artists at Play has developed artistic partnerships with the Latino Theater Company, Chinese American Museum, and East West Players. They have been featured in American Theatre Magazine, The Los Angeles Times, LAist 89.3, Angry Asian Man and Hyphen Magazine, among others. AAP is a member of the national Consortium of Asian American Theaters and Artists, Artistic Directors of Color Alliance — Greater Los Angeles and Theatre Producers of Southern California.

नहा & Neel is a heartfelt comedy that resonated deeply with the Artists at Play team, every one of us the child of immigrants. Neha (नेहा) had such an idea of how to raise her son Neel (नील) in America. But he's 17 now, and during an accidental cross-country college tour, नेहा and Neel must confront the difference between who they are and who they want each other to be. How does every generation of hyphenated Americans negotiate their many cultures, recalibrating the meanings of familial history, authenticity, and cultural affinity? The hope is that this play will remind us, including those raising children of our own, that we articulate culture/s in a wide variety of ways and there is no wrong way to (re)connect with ourselves and our loved ones.

For Artists at Play, it has been a long journey with नेहा & Neel but an even longer one with our playwright. Ankita Raturi was the inaugural recipient of AAP's Emerging Playwright Commission, which led to the exciting new international multilingual play No One Plays Badminton in America. Showcasing the work of a writer we were so excited about early on, we are grateful to Ankita for entrusting us as collaborators for this beautiful work. AAP is honored to be supported by our amazing creative team as well as the staff at The LATC. And now, to finally be joined by you, our audience, we couldn't be more excited to share this world premiere.

Asian Pacific Islander Desi American (APIDA) communities have existed in and contributed to this country, yet we still find ourselves facing stereotypes, hate, and anti-immigrant rhetoric, perhaps because our communities haven't yet become part of our nation's larger cultural imagination. Artists at Play strives to make a small but significant intervention by amplifying and uplifting APIDA stories in Los Angeles theatre and beyond. नेहा & Neel is the story of an epic road trip shared by an unlikely duo: a South Asian American single mom (Neha) and her teenage son (Neel). Here are some pointers to better understand the world of the play:

Jugaad — a quintessential South Asian survival mechanism. The word literally translates to a resourceful, ingenious, and flexible approach to problem-solving using limited resources and improvisation. Neha starts pulling her Jugaad chops at various times during the play! Look for a scene at the airport!

Hybridity — a term originating in biology, hybridity carried negative connotations upon its initial adoption into the English language sometime in the 17th century. In its most recent, and arguably, the most influential usage, Homi K. Bhabha, the postcolonial theorist, argues that cultural identities are formed at the junction of multiple cultures, or the third space of enunciation as he calls it. Bhabha argues that recognizing the ambivalence of cultural identities dismantles the hierarchy of cultural purity and overcomes the exoticism of cultural diversity while recognizing the empowering hybridity within which cultural differences operate.

Third Culture Young People — a term coined by Ruth and John Useem in the 1950s to describe the children of Americans working and living abroad. The term's scope has expanded over the last seven decades, but the central tenets hold up to the additional scrutiny. Third Culture Young People are children who grow up between and with multiple cultures. They demonstrate distinct interpersonal behavior, work-norms, social codes, and communication. This creates a new group that neither fall into the host or home cultures but rather share characteristics with other Third Culture Individuals.

Road trips and South Asians — Open roads are one of the most American things, inviting adventure with its mystique, possibilities, and challenges. Road trips are a typical American rite of passage and South Asian Americans have been partaking in this great American tradition ever since they came here, sometimes by choice and sometimes because it was necessary. Gemstones as colonial loot — Gemstones such as diamonds, rubies, and emeralds were often extracted under exploitative colonial systems and removed from their places of origin to adorn imperial crowns, museums, and private collections in Europe. Their displacement symbolizes both the material plunder and cultural domination of colonized regions, where objects of deep local significance were rebranded as imperial treasures. Today, debates around repatriation highlight how these gemstones remain contested symbols of colonial loot and unfinished histories of the empire.
