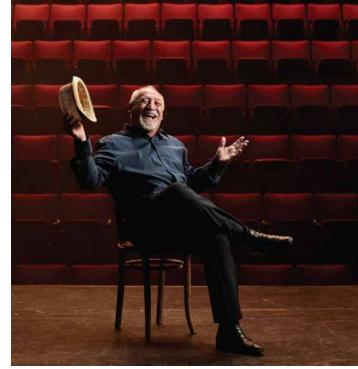

or four decades, Latino Theater Company has proudly served the Los Angeles community, championing diverse voices and illuminating the rich, complex tapestry of the Latina/o/x experience in the United States. As we celebrate this milestone 40th Anniversary, we present a season that embodies our mission: a vibrant collection of stories reflecting where we've been, who we are, and the futures we dare to imagine — all under the unifying magic of live theatre.

This landmark season features world premieres from our Circle of Imaginistas playwrights' initiative, a powerful revival from our history through our Impact Initiative, and a celebrated encore from our 2024 Encuentro Festival, each illuminating our shared human experience.

We begin our 40th anniversary season with the West Coast Premiere of Karen Zacarías' insightful *Just Like Us*, adapted from Colorado's former First Lady, Helen Thorpe's, best-selling non-fiction book. This timely drama follows four Latina high school seniors, best friends who navigate the rituals of prom and graduation while possessing college dreams, but two are undocumented. The play exposes how a piece of paper dictates opportunity, crafts identity, and challenges friendships, while laying bare the complexities of immigration in the U.S., asking what it truly means to belong in the United States.

Next, we present the wildly inventive World Premiere of *The Last Play by Rickérby Hinds*. A Circle of Imaginistas playwrights' initiative commission, this meta-theatrical journey dives into the creative mind as playwright Rickérby Hinds puts himself on stage, wrestling with writer's block, his Afro-Latino identity, hip hop aesthetics, and artistic legacy. Conjuring characters from his past works, the play poignantly deconstructs the relationship between creator and creation, asking profound questions about voice, representation, and the nature of storytelling itself.

Closing out our spring season is an encore production from 2024's Encuentro Festival—in association with Chicago's innovative Water People Theater, LTC presents Rebeca Alemán's haunting *The Delicate Tears of the Waning Moon*. Based on true events in a turbulent Latin American country, this powerful drama follows Paulina, a human rights journalist recovering from amnesia after an assassination attempt. The play is a powerful meditation on the profound personal cost of reporting truth, the nature of grief, and the fragility of freedom in the face of corruption.

Over the summer we proudly present a revival production of LTC's seminal work, August 29, as part of our Impact Initiative, bringing theatre directly into partnership with our community, in collaboration with Los Angeles Community College students. This play revisits the life, work, and tragic murder of journalist Ruben Salazar during the 1970 Chicano Moratorium against the Vietnam War. Exploring the complexities of Chicano identity, the fight against police brutality, and the power of the press, August 29 remains startlingly relevant, reminding us of the enduring power of community activism in the struggle for justice.

On September 13, prior to the opening of our fall season, Latino Theater Company will celebrate our 40th anniversary Gala with **Noche de Luz y Sombra**. Join us for an unforgettable evening as we raise a glass to the artists, supporters, and community members who have shaped Latino Theater Company over four decades and celebrate our shared journey and the vibrant future ahead with joy and festivity.

Our fall season opens the year's second Circle of Imaginistas World Premiere, *The Little King of Norwalk* by Israel López Reyes. With a satirical eye, López Reyes brings us a razor-sharp contemporary fable set in Southeastern Los Angeles. When Juan Perez, a normal guy grappling with his past and a recent DUI, is mistaken for a powerful political consultant, he's drawn into the corrupt underbelly of local politics. The play hilariously and poignantly explores themes of Chicano identity, the allure of power, family legacy, community belonging, and the difficult path to redemption.

Next is another World Premiere commissioned through our Circle of Imaginistas, Miranda González's exploration of the little-known underground railroad into Mexico, *Mascógos*. A trilingual and non-linear drama, this thematically innovative play follows 18-year-old Jamari in 1864 Mexico and present-day Chicago's West Side, and asks profound questions about the meaning of freedom in the painful past and the imperfect present. Gonzalez's play illuminates the contributions and experience of Afro-Latinos to the rich and complicated tapestry of both the past and contemporary American life.

Next we present our third production with Artists at Play, among the most exciting companies to emerge in Los Angeles, and who are dedicated to illuminating the AAPI experience in the U.S., with the World Premiere of Ankita Raturi's delightfully touching नेहा & Neel. What starts as a meticulously planned college tour for Neha (नेहा) and her seventeen-year-old son Neel (नील) quickly derails into a chaotic and hilarious cross-country road trip across the United States, exploring the intricate relationship of a mother and her son. The play navigates the conflicts and tenderness

between an immigrant mother and her American-born child, the nuances of identity, and the bittersweet but inevitable process of a parent learning to let go while a child emerges into adulthood.

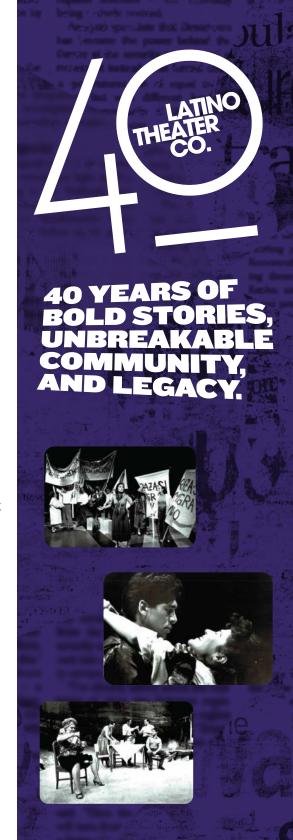
We close our 40th year with our annual production of La Virgen De Guadalupe, **Dios Inantzin.** Adapted for the stage by Evelina Fernández from the mid-16th century text The Nican Mopohua, and featuring over 100 actors, singers and indigenous Aztec dancers as well as children and seniors from the community. La Virgen De Guadalupe, Dios Inantzin is the City of L.A.'s largest theatrical holiday production. Become transfixed by the story of Juan Diego, a simple peasant to whom the Virgin Mary appeared on four occasions in the mountains of Tepeyac near Mexico City in 1531, and his universal story of perseverance and hope.

From the pressures of youth to the weight of history, from the corridors of power to the intimate spaces of memory, our 40th anniversary season seeks to illuminate the complexities of the human experience. These are stories of pain and injustice, but also of profound resilience, unwavering hope, fierce love, and the unbreakable bonds of community. Thank you for joining us for this landmark 40th Anniversary season as we experience the vital power of theatre to connect us, challenge us, educate as, and celebrate the multifaceted human spirit.

RICKÉRBY HINDS (Playwright)

Rickerby (pronounced Rickérby) is one of the pioneers of Hip-Hop Theater who has the unique ability to challenge conventional notions of the stage while embracing its history and traditions. A native of Honduras who immigrated to South Central Los Angeles at age 13, his work draws on his multifaceted background to create theater that is simultaneously challenging, compelling and entertaining. Hinds received his MFA in playwriting from UCLA's School of Theater. Film and Television where he was awarded the coveted Audrev Skirball-Kenis (ASK) Award for best play for an unprecedented two years. His work has been developed by venues including the Latino Theater Company, The Mark Taper Forum, Bay Area Playwrights Festival, The Royal Court Theatre in London and The Oregon Shakespeare Festival (he presented the first hip-hop Theater play in their history, *Buckworld* One, in 2008). Hinds' productions explore the human condition employing the aesthetics, as well as the performance instruments of hip-hop culture - MCing, hip-hop dance, beatboxing, graffiti (aerosol art), and DJ-ing. He is the past chair of the Department of Theater, Film & Digital Production at the University of California, Riverside, and founding director of Riverside Studios, where he continues to break new ground in works for the stage and screen by expanding the definition of both theater and hip-hop expression though works like Dreamscape, in which he uses beatboxing, dance and spoken word to explore the problematic relationship between the Black community and the police; or Amplified Fidelity: An Exploration of Humanity Through Sound, in which the entire history of the universe and human beings' quest for survival is explored using only beatboxing. Hinds is a Fulbright Fellow, and his work has toured Romania, Poland, Austria, Hungary and Turkey, as well as his native Honduras and numerous venues throughout the U.S. His play *Dreamscape* received a record six 2016 Los Angeles NAACP nominations and won three: Best Director for Hinds, Best Lead Actor and Best Lead Actress. It has also been adapted into the award-winning film My Name is Myeisha which Hinds co-wrote and produced.

DAPHNIE SICRE, PhD. (Director) is a multi-hyphenated theatre artist. She is a director-dramaturg-scholar-educator who shares a deep passion for Black and Latine perspectives in theatre, especially AfroLatinidad. Engaging in anti-racist and culturally competent theatre practices, she helps bring stories from the page to the stage. Last year, she was named Co-Artistic Director of Ammunition Theatre in Los Angeles, CA, and Co-Directs the Candela Fellowship for Latine and Caribbean Playwrights with the Dramatist Guild in New York, NY. She has directed for East West Players, Playwrights' Arena, The Robey Theatre, Moving Arts Theatre, Skylight Theatre, Greenway Court Theatre, Garry Marshall Theatre, The Road Theatre, San Diego Rep/Latinx New Play Festival, The Fountain Theatre, Circle X, The Hollywood Fringe/New Musicals Inc, FringeNYC, Bratta Productions, and many more. This fall, she joined the faculty at UC Riverside. When she is not directing, you can find her teaching, working on dramaturgy, or writing theatre scholarship. Her latest publication is a book chapter on AfroLatine identity for The Routledge Companion Latine Theatre and Performance.
