elcome to the Latino Theater Company's fall season of captivating new work at the Los Angeles Theatre Center!

Showcasing three extraordinarily theatrical voices, this season promises to engage our community in cultural discussions surrounding vital issues of cultural appropriation, spiritual understanding, and the complexities of cultural colonization and exoticization within the Western theatrical canon. These vital contemporary works speak to our times and challenge our collective understanding of colonization, religion, and how we consume entertainment in a multicultural society like Los Angeles. Our history is in danger of being forgotten as we face unprecedented challenges together. These remarkable plays provide a human perspective and provoke discussion about the shared desire of our communities, and illuminate our need for cultural dialogue about who we are and how we relate to one another as both individuals and communities from varying cultural backgrounds. They will make you laugh, cry, and meditate on our shared future as human beings.

In collaboration with Artist at Play, *This is Not a True Story* by Preston Choi, provides layers and complexities absent from the stereotypical and sexist exoticized gaze of Madama Butterfly and Miss Saigon and debunks a history of Western Orientalism with sharp humor and grace. Joel Ulloa's *Tacos La Brooklyn* asks his audience to reconsider their biases as he poses questions surrounding complex ideas of cultural appropriation and cultural appreciation. Luis Alfaro's *The Travelers* takes us on a journey into a spiritual world showing us what it means to be human in a harsh, unpredictable, and often cruel world. Latino Theater Company closes our season with our annual celebration *La Virgen de Guadalupe, Dios Inantzín*, a pageant play featuring music and dance that retells the story Juan Diego and his journey of faith, illuminating the power of perseverance and self-belief in the face of obstacles and humiliation.

Thank you for embarking on these theatrical journeys, pondering these profound questions, and embracing the diversity that enriches our world and the human experience.

hank you for coming to see *This Is Not a True Story* by Preston Choi, directed by Reena Dutt. WHO ARE CIOCIO, KIM, AND KUMKO?

Madama Butterfly (1904), the renowned opera by Italian composer Giacomo Puccini, is the story of CioCio, a Japanese geisha who enters a marriage arrangement with American naval officer B.F. Pinkerton as part of the rental agreement on his house in Nagasaki. CioCio gives up everything for Pinkerton, even after he is called back to the U.S., waiting day after day with their son for his return. When Pinkerton returns with an American wife, having truly abandoned her and their child, CioCio commits ritual suicide, choosing to die with honor rather than live in shame.

In *Miss Saigon* (1985), the epic musical based on the opera, Kim is a young Vietnamese bar girl in love with Chris, an American G.I. who agrees to marry her after just one night together, then abandons her during the fall of Saigon in 1975. In the aftermath of the Vietnam War, Kim fights to survive with their son, Tam, believing that Chris will return for them. Once Chris learns of his son's existence, he does return — with his American wife, Ellen. In her heartbreak and desperation, Kim commits suicide so that Chris will take Tam with him to the U.S.

The title character in *Kumiko, the Treasure Hunter* (2014) is based on an urban legend about a real-life person, Takako Konishi, who was found dead in November 2001 after traveling from Japan to North Dakota. According to the myth, which spread across online forums in the early 2000s, Konishi believed that the Coen Brothers film, *Fargo*, was a true story and went looking for buried cash from the movie. The real story was much grimmer: Takako lived alone and had lost her job after 9/11. She went to Fargo — a place she had previously visited with her former married American lover — to commit suicide.

This Is Not a True Story is Artists at Play's third world premiere production. We first met playwright Preston Choi in Chicago when Artists at Play presented a reading of the play at the 2018 National Asian American Theater Conference and Festival. The following spring, we paired him with director Reena Dutt in a workshop reading at the USC Pacific Asia Museum.

Initially announced as our 2020 mainstage production, the COVID-19 pandemic postponed the show until Fall 2023. During the years in between, Artists at Play continued to develop the play with Preston and Reena over Zoom.

For all of Artists at Play's world premieres, we developed the plays from staged reading to workshops and ultimately to production. Our first world premiere was *The Two Kids That Blow Shit Up* by Carla Ching, followed by *Two Mile Hollow* by Leah Nanako Winkler. Following the Artists at Play productions, these shows have since been published and performed across the nation.

Artists at Play is a Los Angeles-based theatre-producing collective dedicated to programming that explores the Asian American and Pacific Islander experience. Since 2011, they have presented plays that demonstrate the humanity and complexity of diverse AAPI communities while championing and uplifting AAPI theatre artists who give voice to our past, present and future.

Artists at Play's mainstage productions have achieved box office success and critical acclaim, including "Critics' Choice" by numerous news outlets and a GLAAD Media Award nomination. AAP's producing history includes Los Angeles premieres, West Coast premieres, and world premieres.

Through their New Play Development program, Artists at Play has provided resources and support to 20 playwrights in crafting new work, with about half of those plays going on to world premiere productions across the United States and Canada. In 2022, they launched the AAP Emerging Playwright Commission, continuing to add new AAPI narratives to the canon of American theatre.

Since 2015, Artists at Play has presented free Theatre for Young Audiences performances as a way to encourage youth to build empathy and understanding between diverse people. These shows have been presented in partnership with the Los Angeles Public Library, Japanese American National Museum and USC Pacific Asia Museum.

Artists at Play has developed artistic partnerships with the Latino Theater Company, Chinese American Museum, and East West Players. They have been featured in The Los Angeles Times, LAist 89.3, Angry Asian Man and Hyphen Magazine, among others. Artists At Play is a member of the national Consortium of Asian American Theaters and Artists, Artistic Directors of Color Alliance – Greater Los Angeles and Theatre Producers of Southern California.
