A NOTE FROM AVRAHAM OZ

The Politics of the Body's Trap: Hanoch Levin's World of Desire

Mounting Yaacobi and Leidental in a context foreign to the language and culture with which the play originally corresponded, seems to require some thoughts which, while obviously do not pretend to cover the wide themes and features contained in the play's rich dramatic texture, may be in place to accompany this theatrical meeting between Hanoch Levin's work and its reception by a totally estranged cultural host.

Hanoch Levin (1943-1999), considered by many as the most significant playwright of Israel to date, started his dramatic writing as a provocative political satirist, in whose work the political body took precedence to the human subjects inhabiting its dramatic universe. From the very outset, however, this dramatic scheme coincided in his writing with initial experiments in full-fledged plays where the manifest, succinct political message gave way to prolonged narratives, mainly pursuing human male's advancement toward fulfilling his subjective bodily desire. The skeletal political fable in which a male-devouring woman (obviously inspired by Israel's rigidly dominant female Prime Minister Golda Meir) confiscates the family's apartment's bathroom as an occupied territory, avoiding the challenging yet subdued figure of "the cousin" (a term often employed in Israeli popular vocabulary as a signifying code for Arabs in general and Palestinians in particular) from freely using it, was converted in Heffetz, one of Levin's early major comedies (whose production just preceded Yaacobi and Leidental), into a dramatic charade where the women in the family, hierarchically deployed in the figures of an ambitious mother, clinging to her gradually waning dominant power over her husband and Heffetz, the cousin (whose dehumanized name, retaining its former political disadvantage, signifies concomitantly both "thing" and "desire"), and Fogra, the cold, aloof and alienated daughter, remotely presiding over and manipulating the action by means of her all-admired, inaccessible statuesque beauty, bring out the coerced, tortuous progression of the male subject towards the destructive fulfilment of his desire.

Contrary to the common reading of his ensuing work, it is my contention that Levin hardly ever abandoned the political core as the nucleus informing his dramatic writing, although it has taken various shapes and forms. In his earlier "neighborhood comedies," anonymously located in the imaginary social space of his childhood off centre suburbs of Tel Aviv, his characters still moved within a semi-realistic locus composed of a bourgeois apartment, a coffee house or a decrepit local cinema. The emphasis on the body and sexual desire is defined

by a social status.

Levin does not hesitate to deploy to the utmost his male subjects' attraction/disgust with the consequences of the female body.

While that holds true for man, it does so even more for woman, whether she be the object of the painful admiration of the male subject or a socio-sexual tool whereby to compromise humiliating loneliness (like Ruth Shachash for both friends Yaacobi and Leidental). All women in Levin's plays figure as a negotiable currency in patriarchal exchange-systems, comprising both potential blessings of bodily functionality and commodification, to the extent that they are serviceable in either or in both. All subjective delineations purportedly characterizing them as individuals, from health conditions to temperament and intellectual constitution, are soon appropriated to serve as parameters of their mercenary value.

The common desiring subject of Levin's early dramatic milieu, who finds itself at the receiving end of Levin's amoral deadly Narcissists, is ironically reappropriating some conspicuous features of what early Zionist drama had rejected as the diaspora components of Jewish identity. Although its notable grotesque elements prevent the early Levinian subject from becoming entirely realistic, its vitality deliberately overshadows the dramatic presence of the exaggeratedly monolithic vestiges of the native tsabar myth to expose the marked Eurocentric nature of the worn out Zionist dream of a European Romantic ideal.

He's received multiple Ovation, LA Weekly and LADCC nominations for roles in *Small Tragedy*, *When They Speak of Rita* and *Happy End*. He starred in *Small Engine Repair* at Rogue Machine, which swept the 2013 LA theater awards for production and ensemble, with Variety

asserting, "Redfield walks off with the evening...there's no end of joy in his irrepressible love of life." As a pianist and composer, he's worked at 24th Street Theatre for over a decade, accompanying their flagship educational show, Enter Stage Right, which serves 10,000 LAUSD school children every year, and he won an Ovation award for his original live score for 24th Street's *Walking the Tightrope*.

Itamar Yaacobi

Ilia was born in Kiev, Ukraine, where he lived for the first half of his life. He is a graduate of Moscow Art Theatre School and a lifetime member of The Actors Studio. In Hollywood, Ilia has appeared in over 170 films and television shows, including two films currently in pre-production: *The Palace*, directed by Roman Polanski, and Paramount's *Self-Reliance*, a film by Jake Johnson. Recent television credits include a five-episode arc in the new HBO miniseries *Full Circle*, directed by Steven Soderbergh, and recurring

roles on Apple TV's The Morning Show and BET's Diarra from Detroit. Last October, Ilia received the NOHO Cinefest "Best Actor" award for his portrayal of Dark in the independent feature Balloon Animal. Theater credits include The Orchard at the Baryshnikov Art Center opposite Mikhail Baryshnikov and Jessica Hecht, and The Revisionist by Oscar nominee Jesse Eisenberg at the Wallis Annenberg Center for the Performing Arts.

She has also done composing/orchestrating/arranging and session work for artists such as Korn, Richard Page, Eisley, Vinnie Colaiuta, Luis Conte, Miles Mosley, Joe Sumner, Ozomatli and Mystic Marley. Nisha has taught music for over twenty-five years, and is the co-founder of Happy Human Music Project–a Los Angeles based music education organization, aimed at providing music lessons for students of all ages and abilities.

HANOCH LEVIN

Playwright

Hanoch Levin was born in Tel Aviv on December 18, 1943 and died of cancer on August 18, 1999. He wrote plays, sketches, songs, stories and poetry, and also directed most of his own plays. During his work as a playwright and stage director, he developed a unique dramatic and theatrical language, created by combining poetic written text and images designed with the actors and set designers, costume and lighting, composer and choreographer. His plays are characterized by his ability to combine the work of different artists, and have always been a celebration of words and visual images, based on a great love for the theater and all who take part in the performance. Levin left a spiritual – artistic legacy, which includes 56 plays (except for his political satires, only 33 of his plays were performed in his lifetime), two books of prose, two collections of sketches and songs, a book of poems and two books for children. In 1999, the last year of his life, he took care to publish all his works

NAAMAN TAMMUZ

Translator

Hanoch Naaman is a translator and technology executive based in London, Uk. He was born in Tel Avivand spent the first twenty years of his life between Israel and London. He obtained his undergraduate degrees and PhD in Physics from the University of Cambridge and has since worked as an excutive and founder of startuos focussed on data science, machine learning and artificial intelligence. He has translated over a dozen plays by Hanoch Levin from Hebrew to English, with eight of these included in the three-volume anthology, *Hanoch Levin:Selcted Plays One/Two/Three*, published by Oberon Press(now Bloomsbury Publishing) in 2020. he lives in London with his wife and two sons.

ALEX KAGAN

Composer

During his military service, Alex met Hanoch Levin for the first time, and after the Six-Day War, both staged the satirical cabaret *You and I and the Next War*, which caused a public scandal. Kagan continued to collaborate with Levin and composed music for eight more plays. Kagan wrote music for about 30 plays with the best playwrights and directors in Israel and abroad, and has also written music for television and cinema. In 1982, he was invited to Germany with the play *Yaacobi and Leidental*, and remained there composing music for theaters, musical management, directing cabarets, theater and opera in Dusseldorf, Stuttgart, Nuremberg, etc. From time to time, he returned to Israel and directed productions with a special combination of opera and cinema: *Le Villi* by Puccini, Anne Frank, Lieders by Schubert, Mahler and more.

YONATAN ESTERKIN

Director

Yonatan is a theater director, writer, speaker and teacher based in Tel Aviv, Israel. He holds a bachelor's degree in political science and philosophy from the Open University, as well as an MFA in theater directing and an MA in theater research, both from Tel Aviv University. He is the recipient of the "Sharet" scholarship from the AICF, and two scholarships from the Goethe Institute for theater experts in Berlin. Esterkin has directed productions at Haifa Theater, where he also headed the International Relations division, The Cameri Theater of Tel Aviv and the Habima Theater, which is the national theater of Israel and Yiddish theater. Esterkin gives lectures and courses about Israeli theater and film from a social and political perspective for institutions such as Israel's Teachers Association and the Media-Tech Center in Holon, and was recently invited to speak about the Holocaust at New York's 92nd Street Y. He has directed Israeli plays in several public theaters in Slovenia, including the National Theater.

PETE HICKOCK

Scenic Designer

Pete is a production designer, art director, scenic designer, and artist based in Los Angeles, California. His designs have appeared across Southern Californian theaters, such as the Geffen Playhouse, the Kirk Douglas Theatre, the Odyssey Theatre Ensemble and the International City Theatre. He holds an MFA and post-baccalaureate from the San Francisco Art Institute and a BFA from Lewis & Clark College.

DENISE BLASOR

Costume Designer

Denise is a Puerto Rican actress, director, writer, designer. Lighting Designer

Michael began theater and lighting work in high school, and has gone on to design and operate lighting for various styles of production, including work in dance, experimental theater, site-specific productions and experiential installations. 


